"A lot of people say they can't save money because it's all used to pay bills," said Kim Carter, the foundation's executive director. "But when we sit down with them and create a budget, they see how much they could save if they got their nails done once every two weeks or went to Starbucks less often."

Carter has offered similar classes in the past, which have garnered rave reviews from participants.

"It covered quite extensively everything from budgeting to real-estate loans, equity, stocks," said Chuck Schnurle of Yucaipa. "It was well presented and organized very well."

Lionel Dexter of San Bernardino said the most important thing he learned is the value of a good credit score.

"Everything else revolves around your credit," he said. "It's important to keep it in good shape."

The free classes will begin Feb. 3 at St. John's Episcopal Church, 1407 N. Arrowhead Ave.
